Reflection for weekend 6th Feb & 7th Feb 2021 Great Christian Thinkers – John Henry Newman

He was an Anglican who became a Roman Catholic. Yes, he was. John (1801-1890) was sent by his evangelical father to a private school in Ealing, West London, before going on to Oxford. But it was at Ealing that he had a conversion experience, thanks to one of his teachers. When did he go into the Church? He was ordained in 1824 and 4 yrs later he was made vicar of St Mary's Oxford. It was around that time that he met up with some friends who succeeded in changing his attitude to the Roman Catholic Church and the Reformation. He became leader of the new Oxford Movement. What was that? It was a series of publications that celebrated the Anglo-Catholic wing of the Church. He argued at first that the Church of England was the via media - middle way - between the Protestants and the Romans. However one of his articles (Tract no. 90) brought an outcry. His boss, the bishop of Oxford, then banned him from writing any more. What was wrong with that? Nothing with that, but he started to argue that the 'middle way' idea was wrong and it was this that indicated his movement towards Rome and away from the Church of England. And did he obey the ban on writing? Well, he was pretty upset by the Protestant direction of the Church and 2 years after his article (Tract 90) he resigned his cleric benefice, preaching a famous sermon called 'The parting of friends'. In 1845 he was received into the Roman Catholic Church. Was he warmly welcomed? Yes he was immediately made head of the Oratory of St Philip Neri in Birmingham, then was made rector of a new Catholic university in Dublin . But what was the reaction when he changed his theology so much? Soon after he was received into the Roman Church he published his Essay on Development of Christian Doctrine, which was a defence of his new way of thinking. But he was still a little cautious and was opposed to the wide-ranging powers of the papacy. Did he get rebuked for that? No, undaunted, he went further. In 1875 he wrote a famous Letter to the Duke of Norfolk pointing out the dangers of the doctrine of papal infallibility. It didn't seem to do harm for in 1879 Pope Leo XIII made him a cardinal. Sounds like he was a very successful Catholic. A great deal of his work came to nothing in his lifetime, but his reputation continued to increase in stature after his death. Some point out that many of his ideas, such as biblical inspiration, the freedom of conscience and the role of the bishops in defining church doctrine, all came to fruition in the Second Vatican Council. Did he also write a famous opera? It was a poem actually. In 1865 he wrote the **Dream of Gerontius**, which, in a wonderful way, tells the story of the journey that begins at death. It was later set to music by Elgar. A very Talented man. Yes, he and even became a saint. He was canonised on Oct 13th 2013 by Pope Francis.

Jesus the Healer

In today's Gospel we read about Jesus' first healing in Mark's Gospel. Jesus hears of the illness of the mother of Simon's wife and goes to her. Due to the purity laws of his time this scene would have been considered controversial. His first healing is of a woman and we are told that he touches her, raises her up; he completely restores her to health. Many of his actions here would have been considered inappropriate.

The 'whole city' was crowded around the door as many people wanted to be healed. What a commotion! Jesus, very early on in his ministry is clearly a very popular and attractive figure. Another important aspect of this story is that Jesus does not remain comfortable in this house. He keeps moving, keeps going outward. This requires so much energy and an outpouring of love for those in need. Jesus shows us in today's Gospel what it takes to stay energised for our various ministries: quiet time and space for real encounter with God. Even then, the people hunted for him and said, 'Everyone is searching for you', and still today, everyone is searching.

We too are called to bring healing to others in any way that we can, to those who are seeking, those who are lost, those who are isolated. Jesus shows us that to do this we must be connected to that Divine Presence within us and in our world. Today we can ask ourselves, what do I need healing from? Bring this to Jesus in prayer. And also, how can I reach out, with a healing presence, to others, especially during this time of pandemic?

'I ask God to prepare our hearts to encounter our brothers and sisters, so that we may overcome our differences rooted in political thinking, language, culture and religion. Let us ask him to anoint our whole being with the balm of his mercy, which heals the injuries caused by mistakes, misunderstandings, and disputes. And let us ask him for the grace to send us forth, in humility and meekness, along the demanding but enriching path of seeking peace'. (Pope Francis, Fratelli Tutti, 254)
